RECTORS THOUGHTS

Did you watch the "Monastery" or the "Spiritual Shopping" series? As fly on the wall programmes go they were better than the average.

Both had one thing in common - even the non religious people find value in the ancient practices of religions.

Living in the monastery following the Rule of St. Benedict and the life style of the monks for 40 days and nights drew the participants into the rhythm of the life; a balance of work, study, pray and reflection. This did not result in new monks, but all changed their lives.

Spiritual Shopping had different people living their normal lives but introducing religious practices into their daily routine for a month. Again not there to convert but to see the effect on the participants lives.

What did they get? Tools to; help evaluate their lives, create positive images, a calmer demeanour, prioritise what is important, aid a sense of fulfilment.

Essentially the tools enable us to recognise an internal sense of well being which is not judgemental and does not require external acceptance. This empowers us to view others from a non judgemental eye. The change of vision changes how we treat people which often changes their response. Others response however does not diminish the value of our internal peace.

The power of viewing the world from this perspective can be seen in Jesus' life. He was the ultimate viewer from a non judgemental eye and he has changed the world.

How do you view the world?

I find the end of the Desiderata prayer comes close for me:

".... Be at peace with God,
.. What ever your labours and aspirations,
in the noisy confusion of life keep peace with your soul.

With all its sham, drudgery, and broken dreams,
it is still a beautiful world.
Be cheerful, strive to be happy."

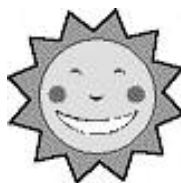

Your details are stored in a plastic container, which is then kept in YOUR fridge.

Two special stickers, that are known to the Emergency Services and other Caring Agencies, are displayed, one on the outside of your fridge door, one on a panel on the INSIDE of your front door (Not visible from outside.)

Complete the enclosed form, fold and slip it into the plastic container.

The village is looking very nice at the moment and it is lovely to see the industry that goes into people's gardens and the instant affect this has on the attractiveness of the village. We still have a couple of problems - speeding vehicles is the most obvious. 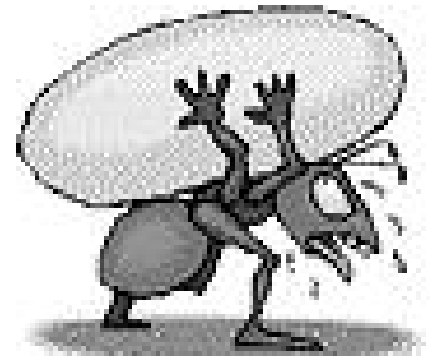
CUMBERWORTH CORNER

Garden Black Ants or *Lasius niger* as a more scientific person may call them. In our garden they have become hyperactive on our recent warm, humid days, so I guess we shall soon see a steady exodus of the winged males and females, stream out from their nests - and I hope there are not too many of you out there with your kettles of boiling water.

My books tell me that ants live in a highly organised society which is matriarchal. The winged males have but a brief part to play in the wellbeing of their nest, for they lose their wings after mating with the females and that is the end for them, while the females after fertilization also lose their wings but they make their way back to the nest to lay eggs for next years progeny.

Though we all use the phrase 'busy as bees', the ants keep themselves busy too. They all have a part to play. Some attend their queens, some look after the eggs, moving them around so that they are all kept warm and in the correct air conditions, others are on guard duty or making running repairs to the nest.

Then there are the foragers who bring back food to those on indoor duties who are fed mouth to mouth. I've not come across an explanation of how they benefit our gardens, but I'd be very suprised if they didn't.
