Rectors Thoughts:-

Your Churches are under threat!

For example, in the early 1970's Willoughby's Sunday attendance was in the twenties and at harvest, Christmas and Easter it was around 70.

Across the group we are like churches throughout the country seeing a third to a quarter the 1970's numbers on a regular basis. The other important factor is that demographic and financial factors have changed. Congregations are older and the money needed for running costs on individual churches are far greater.

For the churches to survive they need commitment and support. Our churches are loved but they lack a large enough body of commitment and support to flourish in the future.

The reasons for the decline in attendance are manifold but I believe the greatest is that faith was based on fear. This was a fault by the church and its priests in its doctrine and preaching. Since W.W.II people have rightly become disillusioned with this theology.

Now we have to acknowledge that:

"If you do not fear God and therefore the priest then you do not need the church and the priest."

I agree whole heartedly that we should not fear God or the priest but that does not make the churches or the priest redundant.

Jesus showed us that life was more than ritual, work, lies and fear. He taught a new way of looking at power and relationships between God and one another.

If the churches are to survive for the occasional offices (weddings, funerals, baptisms) as well as having real meaning in peoples lives how are the simple truths of God's love to be put across?

I believe that we are all religious but need a new way of expressing the positive nature of that love. I would appreciate comments on how you feel this may be achieved.

Bonthorpe Road: Ruts in verges, these are to be infilled by the Highways Department.

Dog Fouling: Notices to be placed in the village.

Traffic Calming: Notices are now in place on poles in the village. In August, road markings are to be placed at the school restricting parking on the corner; and slowing signs on the road at the school and at the entrance to the village on Station Road

Your details are stored in a plastic container, which is then kept in YOUR fridge.

Two special stickers, that are known to the Emergency Services and other Caring Agencies, are displayed, one on the outside of your fridge door, one on a panel on the INSIDE of your front door (Not visible from outside.)

Complete the enclosed form, fold and slip it into the plastic container.

CUMBERWORTH CORNER

Having witnessed a swarm of angry wasps emerge like a black cloud from their hole in the ground nest that had been accidentally disturbed, and then seen them descend on the nearest person and mercilessly attack them, stinging again and again. Well, to say the least, it has left me with a definitely biased attitude towards these creatures.

What has started me off thinking about wasps, was an item in my paper saying that the 'euro' wasp had arrived in this country and was colonising in the south. They are said to be bigger than our own common species and more venomous, so I shall definitely be keeping my eyes out for those.

Though extremely unwise to ignore signs of nests being built in your roof or garden, and you may need the advice of a pest controller to disperse them, you have to have some admiration for creatures that can build themselves football sized nests out of their own spit and chewed wood.

Homets are lesser known cousins of our wasps. They are larger, reddy-brown and yellow in colour, but comparatively rare. Hover flies are often mistaken for wasps as some of them have similar markings, but they are totally innocent of any aggressive behaviour. Unfortunately they are attracted to the jam-jar traps that are hung up to attract wasps.

Most of the busy little insects we see buzzing around our gardens are part and parcel of healthy garden life. We should come to understand them better and resist reaching out for that handy tin of insect spray.

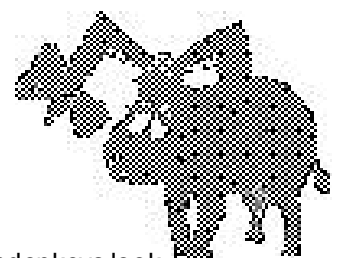
