RECTOR'S THOUGHTS

What is "Church" about?

Being a Christian is about "being", a way of looking at things. Church is the place of conversation between God and the community. The conversation is about the way to look at things. Words like "atonement, redemption, resurrection, incarnation," are used as we talk about God in his world through our readings, hymns and prayers.

The church has spent its history, and we have spent our lives searching for answers and changing the results of our questions over and over again. These answers ultimately will not build our relationship with God. What's important is how we grapple with issues, things that we find difficult, living with people who disagree with us, people who want to force their prejudices on us as we struggle to recognise when we are doing the same to them.

Living the Christian faith at its core is simple:

"God loves us unconditionally
and requests that we
love each other and the universe
with the same unconditionality".

Practically this will require us not to judge situations or people. They need to be assessed as to what has happened and what might happen if certain actions are taken. As our memory, knowledge and vision of the past and future is not complete it is important that we do not judge, give a value of "good or bad".

When you assess a situation yet do not given it a moral value or contain its future, but allowed to be open to different futures, then God acts and whatever the future it will be right for you. This lack of judgement is important as it allows love and energy to flow.

I'm sorry that is not an easy concept to grasp but if you think about it, its truth will reveal itself in a flash or it might take a lifetime.

`Welcome To Spring`

Stipendiary-clergy numbers dropped from 9538 in 2000 to 8942 in 2004, but the overall clergy bill rose. In 2000, it was £ 170.8 million, but by 2004 it had increased to £182 million. The figure included pension costs, which had grown by 11.5 per cent over the period. At the same time, however, giving rose by 5.3 per cent to £511.4 million in 2004, despite shrinking attendance. Each person gave on average £9.92 a week, and giving in 2004 met 86 per cent of clergy costs.
