Cpt. John Smith life story part 3

Late in 1600 John Smith decided to join the Austrian War against the Turks. After several sieges of towns where his reading on warfare gave victory to the Christians, John was promoted to captain in 1602. In one siege he decapitated three Turks heads in challenges of single combat earning the right to a coat of arms by Zsigmond Bathory, Prince of Transylvania - he had become a gentleman.

Not all went his way. The Turks beat the Christians and John was taken as a slave. He killed his slave master then taking his clothes and horse travelled home via much of Europe. He arrived in England in December 1604 aged 24 with a 1,000 ducats as "Cpt. John Smith"

RECTOR'S THOUGHTS

If you ask "What is the basis of the Christian message?" The answer is often "The 10 commandments". This is not true.

The Jewish tradition is based on a moral code that is action based. You will obey the Law for salvation. Jesus made following the Law to salvation impossible because the law says "do not kill" and Jesus adds to think bad of your brother is to have already committed the act.

So why is Jesus doing this? To show the absurdity of the Jewish position. Jesus makes it clear there is only one way to salvation - "for man it is impossible but to God everything is possible" the gospel writer says - i.e.. We are saved by God's Grace not our actions.

This has interesting consequences. We have eternal life independent of who we are or what we do because it's God's choice. Is there a hierarchy and/or conditions for ways into heaven? For example: Being baptised is the minimum, followed by confession of sins, doing good works. What if you have not heard of Jesus? Would this preclude you, do they come under a special category? This is beginning to sound as unworkable as a law based system because it's about what we do not what God does.

What does God do? As I understand it:-

God loves unconditionally and requests that we do the same.

That in a nut shell is the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

It means that we can't separate the holy from the secular, we can't separate out a group of people out as being better or worse than ourselves.

All life's experiences are Holy. All people are equal in God's eyes therefore in ours.

On the world stage it affects how our country views the leaders of other, how we react to natural disasters, the debt of "third world" countries, our life styles and that of our competitors.

On the national and world stage of the Christian Church it effects our regulations on issues of Women in the church (can we exclude them the office of Bishop?), likewise homosexuals, and our relationship to other faiths.

In the local community how do we treat those who's behaviour we find difficult; paedophiles, drug users, those leaving prison, HIV victims, the gentleman of the road?

We have rules and regulations that govern our responses, we also have cultural taboos that effect our behaviour just as the Jews had in Jesus' day but he called for change because it did not fit into God's view of the world. Where do we stand? Do we live by the past or do we work for change?

Loving unconditionally does not mean living foolishly but effects how we treat people. Jesus did not write tablets of stone, nor should we.

WILLOUGHBY TRUSTS

Willoughby has two Trusts; The Anthony Barnes Trust dating back to 27th October, 1727 and The Warren Trust dating back to 6th April, 1919.

The aims of The Reverend Anthony Barnes were fourfold, namely:

1. To provide Willoughby School with special benefits not normally provided by the Education Authority.
2. Providing young persons under 25yrs old, who are in education, with financial assistance.
3. Assistance with expenses while starting a trade or profession.
4. Financial support for a Sunday School.

Canon Warren obviously had other objectives when he established his Trust in 1919, calling it The Warren Nursing Association. The extent of his trust covered not only Willoughby with Sloothby but also Well with St Andrew, Claxby and Dexthorpe. His aim was Relief in Sickness, to include convalescent, disabled, handicapped or infirm.

The direction of these Trusts has drifted somewhat over the last few years to such an extent that at the last meeting there were insufficient Trustees to raise a quorum.

To this end we have decided to call an

Monday 9th October, 2006 at 7.30pm.

to raise awareness and interest in the above Trusts. We need Trustees who are willing to meet twice a year to help direct the future of these very worthwhile and valuable financial institutions.

Snetterton. 16th-18th June. Round 7

Peter shrugged off illness to claim his best results of the season qualifying 19th on the Saturday and a 14th and 10th place in the two races on Sunday. He woke on race day with a stomach bug and spent the morning in the Medical Centre on a drip to rehydrate him and give him a fighting chance of competing. Picking up 8 championship points making a total of 10 from the last two rounds of the series. This now puts him Joint 21st in the championship with another 6 rounds to go and double points to be had at the last round at Brands. Well done Peter.

Knockhill 14th-16th. July Round 8.

Peter qualified 19th on the Saturday. He got away to a good start in Race 1 but lost a place to Greg Larilla who came past mid race leaving Peter to complete the race in 17th position. Race 2 went much the same way with Peter finishing in 16th just outside of the points.

Oulton Park 21st-23rd July. Round 9.

Peter qualified 18th for a fifth row start. As he settled into the race he began to reel in riders, as he was off the line in 19th position, and managed to cross the line in 14th to collect two championship points. Race 2 Peter got bogged down at the start and was 21st into the first corner. He fought his way through back markers to bring the Hawk Kawasaki bike home in 16th just outside of the points. Peter had this to say "I was a bit disappointed not to have scored more points but 16th is not a bad result for me in a field of this class. This is my first season on a Superbike and I am learning more with every race".

Croft 11th-13th August. Round 10.

Wet and windy conditions met us at the North East circuit. Although qualifying was dry Peter struggled due to stoppages and left him with a one lap dash to qualify 15th, his best so far. Race day was wet and windy. Race 1 conditions were wet to dry changing throughout the race. Peter held his own and finished 14th and two points in the bag. Race 2 saw torrential rain with a choice of full wet tyres. Peter made a fantastic start going from 15th on the grid to 4th in the first corner but a clash of handlebars with Karl Harris saw him drop to 6th. A very well earned 8th place was his finish adding another 8 points making 10 over two races. His best result so far. Well done. Sue & Dave Hickman

SLOOTHBY NEWS

Broadband

Rob at Wheelwright Cottage has advised those of us with e-mail that there is a possible opportunity to achieve Broadband through an organisation called 'Zone Broadband'. Their methodology is to establish a Satellite Link Dish Antennae central to a particular area (the Base Station) and link Broadband users to this by a Wireless Network. The wireless network link terminates on a special Subscriber Box on your building through which PC or PCs are linked. Each network has a capacity of up to 25 users (Subscriber Boxes) and for economic reasons they will only establish a system providing there are between 10 and 15 users to start. Costs are as follows:-

Installation Charge - £129.99 Monthly Fee - £24.99 in both cases including VAT. Included in the fees are 5 e-mail addresses free of charge. These are set fees and there are no further charges. The Subscriber Box remains in the ownership of Zone Broadband

Suggested considerations:-

1. The service is 24 hours.
2. You are able to have more than one PC (up to 3) on the network at your terminal at no extra charge. Additions to this can be negotiated.
3. The installation is done for you.
4. The Base Station has to have Clear Line-of-Site with you at 2 – 4 kms.
5. Capacity is 3 Mb (up to 60 times faster than Dial-up).
6. Up load speed is 1 Mb.
7. You can use your telephone whilst still connected.
8. If you are a small VAT Registered business you can recover the VAT element of the fees.

The only concerns is that Wireless is not as reliable as Cable and subject to interference and I have been unable to evaluate that likelihood. In this respect Clear Line-of-Site is more significant than Quasi Line-of-Site.

They are willing to visit and discuss the system at a meeting if you require it and we have the right numbers. If you are positively interested **PLEASE LET ME KNOW BY PHONE, CONFIRMED IN WRITING AND IF THE NUMBERS MEET THE CRITERIA WE WILL TALK TO Zone Broadband.**

Dogs: There are an exceptional number of dogs in the village, and some distress over the amount of dog dirt around the village itself and on footpaths. Almost everyone now co-operates in 'picking-up' after their dogs and I trust you will join in this should you be a dog owner. It is of course against the law not to, with very heavy fines in Lincolnshire hence the visits by the Dog Warden and the appropriate notices.

Footpaths: Please note that the path leading from Hasthorpe Road, between The Mount and the Old Post Office is NOT a designated public footpath and provides authorised access/exit only to The Mount. There is however no objection to it being used as a cut-through at your own risk but please not at all by or with dogs, after all it is ostensibly The Mount's drive and also please ask your children to be careful due to its use by vehicles. The only designated Public Footpath in this area is that leading from Hasthorpe Rd by the Electricity Sub-Station in a straight line as far as its exit/access point by the Bus Stop. The Council have also designated the part of this path that reaches The Mount from the Bus Stop end as an authorised access/exit route for vehicles to/from The Mount.

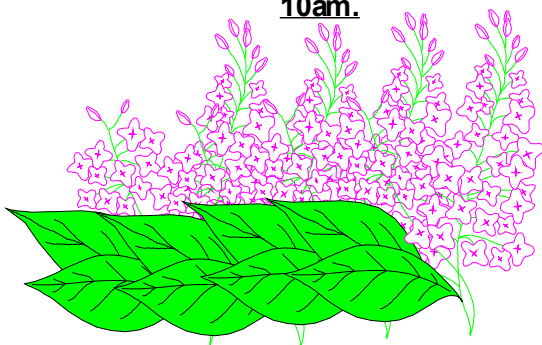
