John's arrival back in England in 1604 was just in time to be caught up in plans to colonize Virginia and he invested in the Virginia company that gained its charter on 10th April 1606.

The colonisers left Blackwall, London on 19th December 1606 under Cpt. Newport on the Susan Constant, Cpt. Gosnold on the Godspeed and Cpt. Ratcliffe on the Discovery.

The Charter, to be opened on arrival in Virginia, named seven men to be on the council these were; Bartholmew Gosnold, Edward Wingfield, Christopher Newport, John Smith, John Ratcliffe, John Martin and George Kendall.

Wingfield was elected the 1st President who chose the Site now Jamestown and landed on May 13th 1607.

Of the 104 arrivals only 40 were left by September.

During the summer Smith traded with the Indians. In mid December he explored three days further north, he was captured and taken on a four day march to Powhatan, the chief of the Algonquinn tribe.

Here was the incident of the "head on the block" and the intervention of Pocohontas saved his life.

JOHN KIRKBY COLLECTION

Willoughby Parish Council and Willoughby History Group have jointly purchased this collection - it will be on permanent display in the village hall.

The collection consists of circa 180 objects, mostly bronze. They date from the Bronze Age, Iron Age, Roman, Anglo-Saxon, Viking, Mediaeval and Post-Mediaeval periods. There are a vast range of items including brooches, ornaments, cosmetic items, pins, buckles, bells, seals, strap ends and mounts.

The finds will be displayed in two wall hung glass fronted cabinets made of oak from a local source. I hope I have designed these to be aesthetically pleasing but not distract from the display within. There will be a storage area within the cabinets for items not on display plus records. The displays may need to be changed periodically if there is too much to show at one time.

At present I am waiting for quotations for the cabinets and will then need to find the funds to purchase them.

It is hoped that this project can be completed before Spring 2007 - this will depend on finding funding for the cabinets and the displays being ready.

Technical details:- for those who like this sort of thing.

Most of the artifacts are bronze and will degrade unless stored and displayed properly, resulting in large conservation costs. The cabinets will be as airtight as possible, the wall behind the cabinets will be covered with a thick foil membrane against damp. There will be an hygrometer in each cabinet to measure humidity and temperature - I'm old-fashioned, so there will also be silica gel. Ideal humidity is between 40-60% with less than 5% fluctuations. Temperature - lower the better, ideally between 40 - 60F range. If a building is full of people these change - but that is not an everyday event in the Village Hall. UV Radiation (Light) should not be a problem in the hall. The stored artifacts will be in museum standard rigid plastic containers and acid free tissue paper, with silica gel sachets enclosed.

For those of you who have suggested other venues for the artifacts - Thank You. I hope the above technical details will explain why, outside of a museum facility, the Hall is the only suitable venue within the village. We need to think beyond ourselves - and to ensure these artifacts are here for future generations. Pat L-B

ABOUT RACHEL GREEN

Chef Rachel Green is renowned for her passion for food, and her love of seasonal and local produce. With two TV series under her belt, and a third in development, she has brought these passions together. In her first series, The Flying Cook, Rachel visited food producers across the region by helicopter, and took the ingredients home to cook in her converted barn.

In her latest series, World on A Plate, to be screened in April 2007, Rachel celebrates ethnic cuisines with families living in the region, from Hindu to West Indian, from Polish to Jewish families. Rachel is also official Champion for Tastes of Lincolnshire and face of the East Midlands, for the Taste England campaign

A farmer's daughter from Lincolnshire, her family have farmed in the county for 14 generations. She has helped lamb ewes, lift potatoes, strip peas from the vine and combine the wheat. "It means I have a huge respect for producers," she declares, "I know just how much hard work has gone into it!" She has cooked for 8 to 800, many times for the Royal Family, ran her own restaurant Grainthorpe Hall for several years. She cooks often on radio and television, including the BBC's first-ever interactive TV series, alongside Delia Smith, Rick Stein and Gary Rhodes.

Her exuberant cookery demonstrations are much in demand all over the country - she has cooked breakfast for Terry Wogan every day for Farmhouse Breakfast Week, for the pea growers of Britain at the Royal Show, at the CLA Game Fair at Belvoir Castle, at the BBC Good Food Show.
