RECTORS THOUGHTS

Spring feels like it has only just arrived and already we are in Summer. Ascension and Pentecost like Easter have come and gone. In the church we now look forward through summer and autumn to weeks of post Trinity before we start the cycle again with Advent. Trinity a time associated with holidays, crops, harvest and towards the end the drawing in of the nights.

It's good to have a cycle and rhythm to life but we also need a sense of development. Science gives us the sense that things are improving. Science appears to be the religion of our time, it appears to cover all the things religion did in the past, including in a secular world providing rites of passage.

I say "appears" because I believe this is a misunderstanding of both religion and science. Science only tells us what something is and what will happen if used in a particular way. It has no morals. The reasons for doing things is a matter of religion, philosophy or politics. For example science teaches us how to split the atom, what it does not do is tell us whether to create electricity or make a bomb to drop on Hiroshima. The answer to that dilemma is bound in politics - in itself not necessarily moral.

Religion is about how we live with one another and in most religions the transcendent. It does not have to be in conflict with science - though sadly often has. Science alters our understanding of the world, for example; Copernicus showed how the earth went round the sun and not that the sun went round us, thus by implication the world was round.

This revelation required adjustment in conceptual thinking and contradicted deeply held teachings about the world and there by religious beliefs. For example; if the world is round, how is it the people in Australia don't fall off? If the sky is not the ceiling of earth then it can't be the floor of heaven so where is heaven?

Religion needs science but science equally needs religion. There are two parts to a religion. There are core principles which go beyond doctrine and views of the world like God is eternal. Then there are the doctrines and codes derived from principles which effect how we understand the world for example; for Jews a precise way of washing hands is a direct command from Yahweh. The latter alter according to developments in the sciences which in turn changes culture for example; dress codes were a matter of religious belief in the west but not now, however they still are among most Muslims. Changes will not however go beyond the core principles. Much religious debate is about what are the core principles e.g.; the debate over women becoming priests and now bishops is bound up with the nature priesthood. The church has decided that gender is not a core principle though there are those who disagree.

Religion affects all our lives because we make decisions every day that at their root are a belief. That belief might be a superstition or on a Christianity learnt as a child. Quality decisions need continual learning. Just as a trained work force requires ongoing training so Christians need ongoing learning.

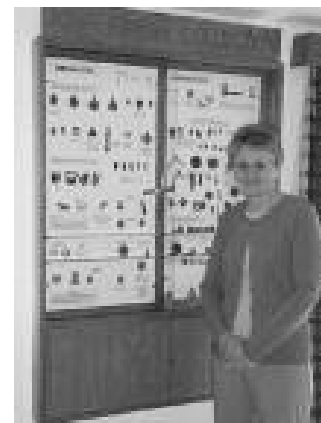

Le Mans April 20th - 22nd

Peter had the time of his life after stepping in at the last minute to help out at the `Junior Kawasaki France Education Team` in the Le Mans 24 hr race. He replaced an injured Spanish rider and made a big impression by running faster than many seasoned riders in qualifying and the race.

Peters times were faster than both his French and Spanish team mates. They qualified in 13th. After 109 laps Peter was up to 8th place and 2nd in his class, but as evening turned to night things started to go wrong. His Spanish team mate had to pull out through injury which left Peter and his French team mate to carry on. Peter had a brake failure and crashed but managed to get back to change bikes, but at 4am the French rider pulled out unable to carry on.

Silverstone Round 3. April 27th - 29th

Unfortunately things did not get off to a good start back home. Free practice on Friday saw Peter have a massive high speed crash, he suffered multiple bruising to his spine but continued to ride on his spare bike. The mechanic worked hard to rebuild his No. 1 bike ready for the next day. On Saturday in free practice Peter had another high speed crash adding more bruising to an already battered body and injuring his hand. He did make it to qualify in 20th. Race 1 he finished 18th and Race 2 19th. Sadly no points this time but thankfully no broken bones either. With no time to recover it was straight on to:

Oulton Park Round 4 May 5th - 7th

On Saturday in free practice it was obvious Peter was suffering, he was being very steady on the bike and his confidence had taken a beating. After yet another crash in qualifying the team took the decision to pull Peter out, as once again his hand had been injured and he needed time to recover. Next- Snetterton 18th-19th May. Sue & Dave

I recently wrote to Sir Peter Tapsell M.P. regarding the local situation. He replied 25th April and said he has received many complaints from constituents about the matter. He forwarded my letter to BT asking for careful consideration to be given to the important points raised. He has since forwarded a response from BT (dated 9th May) which indicates that the matter will be looked into in more detail. BT's letter was signed Clova Fyfe, Head of Parliamentary Affairs.

It seems to me that if communities like ours cannot be part of this great step forward then we will continue to be left further and further behind. The failure in the provision of broadband cannot be good for education and the businesses of today or tomorrow – everybodys future. I know we have managed without it in the past, but isn't there a need to keep up and not get left behind? A recent news item said more and more elderly people are becoming users of the internet, keeping in touch with families and friends, exchanging family photographs etc. This demonstrates that broadband is not just for the younger generation and their gaming skills!

I would be pleased to hear from anybody who is willing to support the persuance of the provision of broadband [by BT] within Sloothby and the surrounding areas. Can anyone contact their representative in (local) Government for example? Do you know anyone who has already taken any positive steps?
