RECTORS THOUGHTS

I've been reading the autobiography of William Johnston S.J. (Society of Jesus commonly known as the Jesuits). Born in 1925 in Belfast he has spent most of his religious life in Japan though he has travelled extensively.

The Society of Jesus is an academic community founded by Ignatius of Loyola 1540 under Pope Paul III. He left only one book the "Spiritual Exercises" which is the core of Jesuit spirituality.

Reading William Johnston's life story is to see not only what the world has been through but also the Roman Catholic Church. The Jesuit experience in Asia and Japan in particular has shown a need to rethink evangelism and a different attitude to other religions.

His career has been a dialogue with Japanese Buddhism and Zen prayer in particular. Two of his main Christian influences were "The cloud of unknowing" and "John of the Cross", he also has a love for Meister Eckhart. On the Buddhist side he has met some of the great men who have brought Zen to the west such as Shunryu Suzuki and Thich Nhat Hanh.

William Johnston was one of my "heroes" in my early theological days. I have read quite a lot of the material that he mentions in his autobiography. My own experience of studying Aikido for many years followed by Tai Chi for the last 15 years has left me sensitive to Asian thinking and a style of Christianity that sees good in all, a God from within.

What's the difference you might ask? Or does it matter?

I would say it does not matter over all, but it does make a difference. The western mystic tradition is more like the Asian traditions of the Sufis. Although the brain and academic study is important it does not place that over experience in contemplative, especially silent prayer.

In the Gospels we see that Jesus spends a lot of time in personal prayer away from the crowds. He also preached a way of believing that those who worked hard 16 hours a day and have no time for long hours of meditation and contemplation have access to God. He said basically if you love the world and your neighbours (including your enemies) from the depths of your heart you will experience God's presence.
